## Hoop Reading

aaron Andrade loves hoops. If there's a game going on, he's in it. So it was not a surprise to learn that last year, when Jaaron was assigned to write a biography for Black History Month, he turned to Wilt (the Stilt) Chamberlain. Jaaron told me that Wilt, who played in the NBA for the Warriors, 76ers and Lakers, broke a record by scoring 100 points in a game. When asked how Wilt did it, Jaaron replied simply, "ball hoggin."

The book Jaaron chose, Wilt Chamberlain, is one of the many sports books in the Paul Cuffee School's Wiggins Collection. All tell stories of men and women who meet or exceed their goals; and a number of them are beautifully illustrated.

Two people were important to Jaaron as he selected his book. "Coach" (Cuffee's lower school Physical Education teacher, Marlon Mussington) talked a lot with Jaaron as he was trying to decide who to study. But the assist goes to Librarian Megan Southard, who made the match between Jaaron and Wilt. Jaaron gushed, "She is so nice, and she helps kids find books."

Jaaron agreed with Miss Southard that especially now, following the election of an African-American President, the Wiggins Collection is vital to students seeking books about African Americans, be they poets or sports heroes. When asked what book he would like to read next. Jaaron quickly pulled one about Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. from the shelf.

# A Letter from the Librarian

ince the beginning of the school year, our youngest students have been experiencing the freedom and excitement of browsing the Paul Cuffee School library shelves. They are learning the lay of the land so that they can locate what they are looking for, and maybe take a chance with an author or genre that is new to them. During our weekly class sessions, we have been doing tours, scavenger hunts, and creating maps of the library. Now when they walk through the door, and they are in the mood for something spooky, they know exactly where to find Patricia McKissack's The Dark-Thirty: Southern Tales of the Supernatural.

To connect the maritime theme to our library navigation skills lesson, I show our students some antique maps and talk about the compass rose. We pretend that we are like the early explorers, forging our way towards buried treasure – our next great read. I have to remind them along the way that pirates from previous centuries didn't just print a map off of Google Earth. They


actually had to travel to uncharted territories in order to record features on a map. So our library mapping exercise starts with a special trip during which we explore the nooks and crannies of our small, but growing collection. My favorite stop on this library tour is at the Wiggins Collection.

As we stand in front of these books, we talk about Rosalind Wiggins, the woman in the picture on one of the shelves. I mention her many attributes, including how much of an expert on Paul Cuffee she was. When I emphasize how Paul Cuffee School is the only school that has this named collection, I watch their eyes widen. I am proud of this shiny new cluster of titles, and it is obvious. The conclusion of this tour results in a flurry of activity around these shelves. When it comes time to pick out books, the children now know that the red dot on the spine means that these books are very special.

I watch a student snatch up *Bud Not Buddy*, the story of a boy navigating the roads of Jazz-age Michigan in search of his true father. I remind him that we also have the new Christopher Paul Curtis book called *Elijah of Buxton*, and that it won the 2008 Coretta Scott King award. "You'll have to read that one next," I tell him. For one of my chattier and more exuberant students, I check out, *Nothing But Trouble: The Story of Althea Gibson*. While scanning her library card I explain that this is a book about the wildest tomboy in the history of Harlem, who goes on to win the Wimbledon Championship. She loves this description and skips off with the book.

These titles are a source of pride for our students, for me and for the School. I am thrilled that the Collection is growing because every week I watch the half-filled shelves emptied by eager hands. I look forward to the day that I can point to the entire wall of shelves behind me, brimming with new titles in our Wiggins Collection. "No need for you to crowd your neighbors," I'll say. "There are more than enough books for everyone."
